An area between a house and an oncoming wildfire where the vegetation has been managed to reduce the wildfire threat and to allow the firefighters to safely defend the house.




"Fire proof" plants don't exist


- High moisture content
- Low-growing habitat plants = shorter flames
- Less flammable chemicals














Emphasize non-combustible materials like gravel, herbaceous plants, or succulents





Within 30 -100+ ft is the "REDUCED FUEL ZONE" (Zone 2)



RECOMMENDED DEFENSIBLE SPACE DISTANCE

	Flat To Gently Sloping 0-20%	Moderately Steep 21-40%	Very Steep +40%
Grass Dry grass (cheatgrass and weeds).	30 feet	100 feet	100 feet
Shrubs and Woodland (sagebrush, pinyon and juniper).	100 feet	200 feet	200 feet
Trees Forest trees (Jeffrey pine). If there's a substantial shrub understory, use those values stated above.	100 feet	100 feet	200 feet




If you have dense shrubs, you want to provide separation...





Double the height of shrubs to get optimal spacing...


